# <u>News from the Classes</u>

This week in *Acorn* class we have been watching the hatched chicks as they grow bigger and stronger. We had the opportunity to handle them carefully on Monday and observe them really closely. They have now been returned to Georgina and we will miss them very much, but we are very grateful for the opportunity to look after them and are glad that they will have the opportunity to have more space outside.

In Maths, we have completed the units on position and direction with flying colours. Y1 have moved onto partitioning numbers and Y2 have moved onto time. Reception have been looking at the wonderful maths story books that we have recently purchased and have looking at doubling numbers. In English, we had a look at another Anansi story from Ghana. Up to his old tricks, Anasi was not a good friend to Turtle when he should have been. He regrets it though when Turtle manages to teach him a lesson!

We completed our studies on Africa and Kenya by looking at the similarities and differences between children's experiences and schooling here and there. It has been a fascinating topic that the children have really embraced and has spread across all areas of the curriculum. In RE we considered the importance of holy books to different religions and looked more closely at the Torah, which we discovered was actually a rather long scroll!

We have completed our unit of gymnastics which was great fun and we look forward to starting swimming lessons after half term. Don't forget your swimming kits and to wear a school uniform that is easy to put on by yourself!

We managed to dodge the rainfall on Wednesday by rescheduling our Forest School session for the afternoon. A slightly shorter session was definitely a good trade for staying dry.

This week's **Star of the week** is **Emily** for working so hard in everything that she does, but particularly in English this week. Her writing on Monday used so many different writing techniques, it was really, very impressive. Well done Emily!



The *Oaks* this week have been working hard in Maths with the Y5/6 children getting to grips with line graphs by reading, interpreting and drawing them. The Y4 children have continued to delve into decimals and Y3 have been mastering mass by reading scales, comparing and solving problems about weight.

In English, the children have looked at synonyms and finding out alternative words that mean the same thing. They have also begun to look at dilemmas: what they are, what decisions may be made and how people may feel during the decision-making process. They have planned a dilemma story following some feature spotting in a model dilemma text.

Our highlight this week has to be our visiting chicks from the Acorn class. We loved holding them, looking closely at them and handling them carefully.
